

From the Minister

Rev Dr I M Greenshields

Can you forgive easily? Our natural instinct is self-protection and when we've been hurt or injured, we are rarely full of mercy, grace and understanding.

Forgiveness is often difficult to do, but so necessary. The Bible offers us clear insight and answers for many of the questions we might have about forgiveness. We are instructed to forgive as the Lord forgave us in **Colossians 3:13**- *"Bear with each other and forgive whatever grievances you may have against one another. Forgive as the Lord forgave you".* And it's not a one-off act, Jesus answers Peter in **Matthew 18:21-22** when he asks *"Lord, how many times shall I forgive my brother when he sins against me? Up to seven times?"* Jesus answered, *"I tell you, not seven times, but seventy-seven times".* Jesus leaves us in no doubt that while forgiveness may not be easy for us, it is not a one-time choice and effectively we must live in a permanent state of forgiveness. Jesus knew that even though we forgive, the memory of that hurt is still there and we need to free ourselves from the bitterness and resentment of the hurt. Forgiveness is important to Jesus: He forgave his persecutors on the cross, and against this example we must continue forgiving until the matter is settled in our heart.

Since forgiveness goes against our nature, we must forgive by faith, out of obedience to Jesus - whether we feel like it or not. We may really want revenge and retribution, but that is not our choice. However, forgiveness is often a slow, painful process. The good news is that when we do forgive, the Lord sets our hearts free from the anger, bitterness, resentment and hurt that previously imprisoned us. We are the ones who suffer most when we choose not to forgive.

The best reason to forgive is because Jesus commanded us. The Bible is clear that if we don't forgive, neither will we be forgiven. **Matthew in 6:14-16 tells us that,** *"if you forgive men when they sin against you, your heavenly Father will also forgive you. But if you do not forgive men their sins, your Father will not forgive your sins."* We also forgive so that our prayers will not be hindered.

Mark in 11:25 tells us, "And when you stand praying, if you hold anything against anyone, forgive him, so that your Father in heaven may forgive you your sins."

There is much to forgive. Outside of our personal issues, the news reports modern atrocities and persecution daily. We are also looking back at past conflicts as anniversaries of events of the world wars are remembered. Eva Kor explains at the trial of **former Auschwitz guard Oskar Groening why she has forgiven her persecutors under much criticism from family and the public:**

"As long as we understand my forgiveness, that the victim has a right to be free, you cannot be free from what was done to you unless you remove from your shoulder the daily burden of pain and anger and forgive the Nazis – not because they deserve it, but because I deserve it."

We forgive out of obedience to the Lord. It is a choice, a decision we make. As we forgive we discover that the command is in place for our own good, and we will receive the reward of our forgiveness – freedom.

"ON MY OWN." by St Margaret's Reader Gordon Brown

I have taken a 'year out' to pursue my own very personal 'bucket list' and eight months on, I am well through it.

A bucket list should contain a number or experiences or achievements that a person hopes to have or accomplish during their life time. The concept has its origins in the phrase 'kick the bucket' and was popularised by the 2007 film 'The Bucket List' starring Jack Nicholson and Morgan Freeman (worth watching!)

My wife, Helen, and I have many different tastes. Because of that I have found myself going off 'on my own' to experience or achieve some of the things on my bucket list. One such was a six day trip travelling slowly up the west coast of Harris & Lewis.

I know the Western Isles quite well from my days in fisheries management. I was quite often on the islands, but they were business trips where one flew in and flew out again quickly. Now, I wanted time to explore the remote Atlantic side of the Harris and Lewis. I also wanted to see how I would get along 'on my own' in these remote places.

I went in late April. The weather was generally very good, ranging from beautiful warm, sunny days, to very strong winds, and latterly heavy snow on the way back. I B&B'd at three places – **Seilebost in Harris**, surrounded by magnificent white beaches and overlooking the Island of Taransay (where the TV programme 'Castaway' with the likes of Ben Fogle was filmed.) From there I moved up to **Callanish** in the south of Lewis where, from my bedroom window, I could see the haunting Callanish Stones. My final stop was at **Ness** up in the very north, at the **Butt of Lewis** where I stayed at the old Decca radio communications building. My D, B&B here was exceptional. The accommodation was homely and comfy, the home made meals 'to die for', and to top it all, I will long remember our host playing Gershwin and other jazz and blues songs on a grand piano while we dined!

But how did I feel in these remote places – 'on my own'? At Callanish there was no radio or TV. In other parts, no mobile phone signal and nobody else around.

Throughout this 'year out' I have kept a journal. The extracts below best reflect how I felt and coped on my own –

"It is very strange to be on my own. With no particular agenda in these remote parts – I am just wandering, exploring – and it is challenging. It would be easy to feel melancholy at times. Easy to lose confidence and withdraw - but I won't. In fact, being on my own, I find myself talking to almost everyone I meet. Not something I would normally do if Helen [my wife] or some other friend was with me. So I don't actually feel on my own at all. Everyone is friendly.

There is a 'quiet', a 'silence' here that doesn't exist at home, where even on a quiet day, there always seems to be a distant background noise. Here there is no noise whatsoever most of the time.

It is a time, an environment, in which to listen to one's inner self. It is a time of quiet when I can really listen to and think about my emotions. In the hurly burly of everyday life we all too often fail to heed our emotions, how we feel, and that is a loss. We also fail to find the time to be still and listen for the Spirit of God, speaking to our inner being.

Being on my own, even if only for this short time, has also brought home to me how I must take decisions on my own. As a couple, or a group, one shares one's thoughts and ideas about how to proceed or what to do next. We seek endorsement or dismissal. We 'agree' a course of action. On one's own we have to decide for ourselves.

I think I'm apt to 'dither'. But we can't have that. So I push myself into deciding – where to eat, what to buy (if anything), which way to go and so on. And it feels good. Even in these little ways it makes me feel more decisive. I need to cultivate a – 'get on with it' mentality!

Sadly, the only time I did feel 'on my own' on the islands was when I attended a Sunday morning service. I won't name the church or its location. But like many of the island churches there was a large congregation – but apart from a brief 'Good morning' at the front door, not a soul spoke to me. I felt invisible. I felt 'on my own' for the first time. It was another lesson. We <u>must</u> always be ready to really welcome any visitors into our church and congregation and find out what brings them to us. It is so important.

Ever since my trip to Harris & Lewis I have been continuing to guard against 'dithering'. And so has Helen. To help us, we now have on our kitchen door a new, professionally printed sign which says – "*Just get on with it…*" It is another of the lessons from this 'year out' and from the experience of being - 'on my own'.

J.A.M. Club News

The final sessions of J.A.M. Club, before the school summer holidays, were busy times for us! We all enjoyed planting geraniums in Colourful Ceramic pots, which we had decorated. The older members made unusual boxes and these were filled with delicious Edinburgh Rock sweets. These items were made to be sold as a further effort towards providing help to needy families in Nepal, following the terrible earthquakes. We are happy to report that the sum of £30 was raised at the Thursday Cafe.....making a total of £80 sent to the Charity UNICEF. We received a lovely letter from UNICEF, thanking us for providing money which is being used to make a real difference to people in Nepal. J.A.M. Club would like to thank everyone who supported this fundraising event.

Our final meeting began with a time of worship which was led by Jain. It was wonderful to share this special time in Church with the Children who are learning that participating in a service can be a lovely experience.

Following this, we had an outdoor scavenger hunt. The children enjoyed searching for various items in the beautiful evening sunshine. We went on to play fun games and have very welcome cool drinks with tasty snacks to end our time together. It was hard to believe that we had reached the end of another year of J.A.M. Club meetings!

We, too, are never alone. Even when we will not acknowledge that we know it. **GOD** is



always watching over us, sitting on the stump beside us. When trouble comes, all that we have to do, is reach out to Him!

If you liked this story, pass it on. If not, you took off your blindfold BEFORE dawn. Moral of the story: Just because you can't see GOD, It doesn't mean that He is not there. "For we should all walk our lives by FAITH, not by sight."

PROPERTY COMMITTEE REPORT

- The decoration of the Vestibule Landing and Staircase is now complete. The Partition in the church has been cleaned and painted a great improvement.
- The passageway leading to the Lower Hall will be decorated within the next month. Shelving will be installed in the store room in the Lower Hall, after a very successful de-cluttering programme.
- In the kitchen area, necessary short term improvements will be made but the Property Committee is considering the feasibility of refurbishment.
- The central heating system is being upgraded to present day standards which will include a new control box and digital clocks. This will ensure that the Church buildings will be heated more economically.
- Regarding the premises at the rear of the Church, it is planned to clean and paint the Flower Room, Disabled Toilet and the Store room.
- The roof of the church has been inspected by a surveyor and a report regarding the condition is expected shortly.

DUNFERMLINE FOODBANK UPDATE

Thank you once again for the contributions to the Foodbank: 67.7kgs of food has been donated from St Margaret's Church this period.

Thanks to everyone who contributes either cash or food, the Foodbank team are grateful for all donations. There is now a blue box on the top landing next to the Rita Elder Hall for contributions.

Items urgently needed are: juices (either long life or diluting), sponge puddings, mashed potato, sugar, non-food items such as washing up liquid, soap powder, gents deodorant and shaving foam.

STAMPS – ongoing collection

Thanks for all the donations of used stamps, they are being recycled by CHAS charity at the Kinross stamp shop.

World Mission has also issued an appeal for stamps. This is to support the Church of Scotland HIV Programme, enabling our partner churches to respond to the challenge of HIV in their communities. They support 29 projects in 17 countries, including Scotland. Over 35 million people worldwide are living with HIV. NEWS SNIPPETS FROM THE WORLD MISSION COUNCIL

The August/September edition features:

Human Trafficking: A Global Phenomena

Human trafficking is a form of modern day slavery in which people, most often women and girls, are forced, threatened, coerced or deceived for the purposes of labour exploitation, commercial sex exploitation and domestic servitude. It is a complex problem which affects almost every country in the world. Sub-Sahara Africa has the highest percentage of child trafficking in the world. Our partner, the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian (CCAP) Synod of Livingstonia says that human trafficking is a serious problem in Malawi, particularly in rural areas where there is extreme poverty, with people being trafficked internally in the country and across borders. The problem of human trafficking has been growing in Nepal, largely due to poverty, and it is feared that this will become worse following the recent earthquake.

World Week of Peace for Palestine and Israel 20-26 September 2015

'God has broken down the dividing walls'

Every year the Palestine Ecumenical Forum of the World Council of Churches invites Christians all over the world to join together for a week of advocacy and action in support of a just peace for all in Palestine and Israel. The theme for 2015 is 'God has broken down the dividing walls'.

The work of the Waldensian Church

Things that happened at The General Assembly

2015 was a great year for World Mission at the General Assembly. We welcomed wonderful delegates from across the world, met with many of you and had a blast at Heart & Soul!

- The Evangelical Presbyterian Church in Ghana invited the Presbyterian Church of South Sudan to their General Assembly to look at how they can help South Sudan.
- Wilson McKinlay, Benbecula, Uist, said: 'We have been twinned with Jerusha, PCEA for four years and it has been a remarkable journey. We have been humbled by the generosity we have received and they credit us for giving them the most precious thing they have – the Bible.'
- Rev Ram Kuma Budhathoki from Nepal and Rev Ibrahim Nseir from Syria were interviewed by BBC Radio Scotland to talk about the situation in their countries.

The StARS of Cairo, Egypt

World Mission Council member Maureen Jack tells us about the amazing work being done with refugees in Egypt.

Over the years people have come to Egypt seeking refuge from conflict in countries such as Eritrea, Ethiopia, Iraq, Somalia, South Sudan and Sudan. Recently there has been a huge influx from Syria. Currently there are about 500,000 refugees in Egypt.

Working to support refugees is St Andrew's Refugee Services (StARS, www.starsegypt.org), which operate out of St Andrew's United Church in Cairo. The church was established by the Church of Scotland, and dedicated in 1909 by the then Moderator. It is a member church of our partner the Synod of the Nile, and Rev Kirsten Fryer is its Lutheran Pastor. StARS has its own Board, but is very much part of the church's ministry.

StARS' core services for refugees include education, psycho-social services, and legal services. See magazine for the full article.
