<u>Letter From the Minister</u> **Rev Dr I M Greenshields**

Dear Members and Friends of St. Margaret's, First of all, let me wish you every blessing for the New Year.

The latter part of 2015 saw us fundraise for two very different hot-spots in the world – Syria and Nepal. I am very proud of the wonderful response from St. Margaret's whereby we were able to send nearly £4000 to Syria and raised enough money to build 7 homes in Nepal!! Wonderful!! I felt able to enjoy Christmas knowing that we had contributed to the wellbeing of very needy people and a big thankyou to everyone who contributed.

The New Year sees us face two challenges — I am going to call them "opportunities" rather than challenges! It has been obvious for some time that our roof is in poor repair which is hardly surprising after 40 years. We have appointed an architect to take care of the project of putting on a new roof and we will be able to come to the congregation with full costings and a financial plan. I do not think this will be beyond us as a congregation but it is likely to be a considerable sum of money. I see this as us investing in our church building to ensure good premises for the next generation — we have done a lot to bring the building internally up to standard now we need to secure the externals!

The other opportunity before us is to find the funds to employ a part time youth and family worker. We have now got funds of £18K set aside [café money over two years and grants from Presbytery] as well as promised giving which I will institute over the next few weeks. We will be applying again to the "Go For It" Fund – our application was turned down for good reasons last year but if we apply properly this year we could be looking at £10K a year for the next 3 years and this would allow us to progress the services of a part time worker. This is every bit as important as the roof because we need to get cracking on bringing families into the church and building on what we have done with JAM and this cannot wait 5 years until we have paid for a new roof.

Strategy? Two-fold! Prayer. There is no doubt in my mind that as a spiritual exercise this calls us to pray for the Lord to open doors, hearts and wallets! Second, for us to ask whether or not there is a priority in our own minds that the Kingdom of God and its growth here comes before any other priority!

Opportunities then for the coming year and I am not daunted by the task but invigorated at the potential to put our faith and commitment to the test.

The Kirk Session met on Monday 14th December 2015.

- It was decided to ask the congregation whether to continue to meet at 10am or move to 11am on Sunday mornings tea and coffee to be served from 10.30am. The reason for considering this change is the number of people who are either not able to make it for 10am or are finding getting there for this time increasingly difficult. The congregation will be formally polled on the matter, but please give the Session your opinion.
- It was decided to do away with the communion card system. This will be replaced with a letter from the minister and session before each communion giving an update on what is happening in the church as well as an invitation to attend communion.
- The frequency of communion was discussed with the possibility of having communion every month and still having 4 main communions where people were sent the update and invitation letter – this will be discussed at the next Session meeting but please let us know your opinion.
- It was indicated to the Kirk Session earlier that the current church roof is badly in need of repair/replacement. After taking professional advice it has been decided to put into effect the process of replacing the current roof surface along with any repairs that will need done to the roof itself.
- Data Protection is a government requirement for all churches. The Minister is currently visiting the whole congregation to explain the current legislation and seek permission to hold information – this will take a number of months, but expect a visit!!



.....SO, IT'S BACK TO WORK!

My 'year out' is over. My 'bucket list' completed, at least for now. I am ready to do some work again. I have had a marvellous year. A real learning experience. Full of new and different experiences. I have met many interesting people. And with time to 'think' and 'read' I have been challenged, in the way I view things and in my spiritual beliefs.

If you can afford the time and the money – for there is a cost – I would certainly commend the idea of 'taking time out'. Anyone can do it. It's not only about working people taking a 'career break'. You might be a student, a housewife or retired. Taking 'time out' to do something different shakes us out of our normal daily routine and freshens us up. Take us long as possible. A 'year out' may seem a long time, but I can assure you, the time has flown in.

One of my objectives during the year was to visit as many different churches as possible. I wanted to learn how 'others' – especially other denominations – worshipped. Where possible, I also wanted to learn how they 'operated'.

As I wrote in another article, my first experience, early in the year, was with the Jesuits in Glasgow. They were so welcoming and demonstrated the importance of setting aside time regularly for contemplation and reflection. I then experienced worship of a very evangelical nature in the Western Isles. On other Sundays, Helen and I visited various parish churches in Fife, Perth shire and the Lothians. Most were of a traditional nature, poorly attended with few if any youngsters and not terribly welcoming. By contrast, Perth Baptist Church attracted a large congregation with youngsters of all ages, particularly teenagers. Like most Baptist churches, Perth is extremely welcoming. When I asked the reason for their success, they said – prayer.

In early September, I achieved a long standing ambition to visit – Canterbury Cathedral. I travelled out to Kent on the High Speed Rail. Boy, did it shift! Canterbury is not as big as some cathedrals, Durham for example, which we'd

visited earlier in the year. Nevertheless it is majestic, historic and a very special place of worship.

However, looking back at my journal I said — "The visit was very worthwhile. I enjoyed it. But I felt disappointed. The tours, the building, are all about Archbishop Thomas Beckett, murdered within the precincts of the cathedral because he would not do the monarch's bidding (Henry II). It is a shrine to Beckett. Neither God, nor today's worship or ministry were spoken about. Even the magnificent stain glass windows all round the high altar depict scenes from Becket's life — not Christ's, not the gospels. I found that odd."

In October, I travelled out to visit family in New Zealand. My cousins are all active Christians in different denominations – Baptist, Presbyterian and Anglican. I was in Christchurch on three consecutive Sundays so visited three different churches – 'mega churches' as they are called. The 'mega churches' are invariably evangelical and have grown at the expense of smaller churches, particularly those of a conservative, traditional nature. One of my own cousins has suffered as a result of this process. He was Pastor at a small to medium sized city Baptist church. He too offered an evangelical ministry. But over time, members, including elders and office bearers, decided to move to the 'mega churches' as they were able to offer so much more – larger congregations, a greater sense of community, facilities in daily use, youth ministries and so on. Earlier this year the Baptist Union of New Zealand told my cousin and his wife that their church would need to close, because it was no longer considered viable. They have risen above the personal pain this caused – and now attend one of the 'mega churches' that brought their ministry to an end. Is this the way that we in the Church of Scotland should be following? Fewer, larger churches, able to offer more?

I enjoyed all three 'mega church' experiences. The worship was in fact fairly similar. They were all well attended. At two of the three, there were loads of youngsters. All three had the most professional Praise Bands I've ever heard (any one of them could win 'The X Factor'!) The music and singing – almost all modern hymns and songs – was passionate and uplifting. And the 'sermon messages' were all relevant to the times.

At Hope Presbyterian Church in Hornby, Christchurch (if you have computer access, take a look at their website), my cousin arranged for me to meet the Senior Pastor to discuss their success as a church. Thirty years earlier he had been the sole Pastor. Now there is a ministry team of seven, each specialising, but also inter-changeable. But their first appointment had been a church manager/administrator to coordinate activities and lift the paperwork burden from off the minister(s). He described the church as - 'prayer-driven; trusting that God would provide; always looking and planning ahead. This created confidence and a belief that anything, if well thought through, was do-able. Among their priorities were — worship music; spiritual renewal; young people's ministry; encouraging inter-generational time together, in other words, one community. Looking ahead he thought it would be the 'mega-churches' with a Contemporary evangelical message that would develop and grow. Whereas those offering a traditional approach would continue to decline and eventually disappear.

It has been marvellous to have the time and freedom to visit other churches. Some were a depressing experience; others were highly uplifting. But we cannot worry too much about 'other churches'. We must devote our energies into making 'our' church one of the most welcoming and vibrant worship centres around. Or as the New Zealand Pastor put it – prayer driven and confident that God will provide and help us deliver our hopes and dreams.

And so...it's back to work!

J.A.M. Club News

Following a lovely long holiday break, we resumed our meetings at the end of August. Happily, many of our "regular" members returned and we were delighted to welcome several new children.

We try to be creative in the activities which we present to the boys and girls and the first challenge of the session was to build a Lego model which would tell us about themselves! This was great fun and provided an insight into each child's interests.

In September we talked to the children about the situation in Syria. From television reports, the children were aware of the plight of Syrian people. Iain explained that the congregation was trying to raise money to help Syrian Christians settle in Poland.

This led to discussion about how we might raise money to help this effort...little did we know that our fundraising idea would be such a success! It was decided to "Sing for Syria" With the help of our recording team (Morna and John) we made CDs of some of our favourite songs. There was a competition to design the CD cover – Paige Grieve won and the finished CDs looked wonderful. This effort raised £130!

At J.A.M. Club our main aim is to tell the children about Jesus and help them understand how He changed people's lives when He lived on Earth...and continues to do this today. They learned about Zacchaeus...a man who had few friends and was unhappy, until he met Jesus! We went on to talk about our friends, problems we encounter with relationships and how we can always rely upon Jesus to be a friend who will never let us down.

On Remembrance Sunday, the children displayed great respect for those who were injured or lost their lives in the service of their country. It was good to listen to their thoughts regarding the futility of war. During Advent we have been thinking about "Peace", and our younger boys and girls created their own colourful dove by fingerprint painting!

Recently we have been blessed with the help of three young volunteers (Ewan, Cameron and Dale) who are wonderful additions to the JAM Club team.

It is our custom to have a time of worship, led by Jain, at the end of each month. During this time, the children were reminded of the continuing hardships facing families in Nepal. How could JAM Club help?

It was decided to organise a coffee morning...this took place on 6th December. We never imagined for a moment that we would receive such wonderful support from our church familyti The magnificent sum of £400 was raised.

At the time of writing this report we are busy preparing for our Nativity Play which is to be part of the Family Service on 20th December. It is a very busy time for us all...but a precious opportunity to remind the children who come to us each week of the true meaning of Christmas. In this time of worrying about what to give people, we remind the boys and girls about the people we should be thinking of most, the REALLY IMPORTANT FAMILY...Mary, Joseph and Jesus, and the greatest gift of all...our Saviour.

For more than 25 years I was Santa Clause, Mrs. Clause, Rudolph and all the elves. I fought the shopping malls and the traffic. Christmas depended on me from the right shirt size to the consistency of the gravy. I was the creator of Christmas for my family and I was weary under the burden.

One year in early November I suddenly realized that Christmas was upon me again. But I was too exhausted to face another major production. I asked myself, "What does all this work and stress have to do with the birth of the Saviour?" Something was wrong. I had grown to hate Christmas. I seriously contemplated what would happen if I stepped out of Christmas. What if I left the front lines? Would Christmas happen? Would my family forgive me?

For my own survival, I retired. I stepped off the Christmas stage where I had been the star for so long. I made a small list and checked it once. There were fewer presents and limited festivities. And guess what? Christmas came anyway. It was quiet, peaceful. There was time to feel the season. Christmas was in the air. It was in my heart. I thought about Christ.

I have to admit that I worried about the reaction of my family. Some were disappointed. But there was more time to visit each other, more time to appreciate the gifts we opened. Christmas was more spiritual.

I realised that I had suffocated the real spirit of Christmas with all of my own trappings. Why had I assumed such a responsibility – to try to create a celebration to outshine the birth of Christ the child? That seemed sacrilegious now. My new theme for December became "Be still and know that I am God".

I will never go back. I have fully found the spirit of Christmas. But first I had to find the courage to let go. I had to trust that the spirit of that humble birth over 2,000 years ago would be felt without my efforts. It was, and this was the best of gifts I could have received or given.

REPORTS FROM THE COMMITTEES

Property Committee Report

- New time switches for the heating system have been installed in the Church and it is hoped when they are up and running we will have a more efficient heating system.
- Light fitting have been replaced in the Vestry, the Session Room and the
 passage at the rear of the Church. A light has been installed above the
 side door of the Church which will light up the area surrounding the ramp
 for disabled people.
- In the Session room, remedial work is required to counteract rising damp, and in the Lower Hall shelving will be installed in the store room. A new distribution box (fuse box) has been installed in the flower kitchen to comply with present day regulations.
- It is hoped that early in the New Year, two parking bays will be provided for disabled people and a ramp formed for the benefit of wheel chair users.
- Attempts are being made, in the short term, to prevent roof leaks in the Kitchen and Upper Hall

NEWS SNIPPETS FROM THE WORLD MISSION COUNCIL

We have a new Mission Partner, Rev Kate Reynolds from Edinburgh, who together with her husband Justin, will be taking up the post of Minister at St Andrews in Tiberius. St Andrew's Scots Memorial Church, Jerusalem was built to honour the many Scottish soldiers who died fighting the Turks during the Great War, ending Ottoman rule over Palestine. Kate and Justin left for Tiberius in November after a Commissioning service in Dunfermline Abbey.

We will be kept up to date with Kate's news by newsletter, details of which will be found in future copies of this magazine.

NEPAL

Joel Hafvenstein and his wife Fiona along with their sons Caleb (4) and Isaac (1) are joining the team at the United Mission to Nepal. Joel will become a Church of Scotland Mission Partner in Nepal. Both Joel and Fiona have had previous experience of working with Tearfund in Afghanistan and going out to other countries from the UK HO.

They will be working alongside partners to reduce their risk to natural disasters, such as earthquakes, floods or drought and making people less vulnerable. For example in the case of earthquakes, making houses better able to sustain the quake or in drought developing drought resistant crops.

They both feel that it was a call from God that has drawn them to Nepal. After much time in prayer and talking to friends they felt very strongly that this was where God wanted them to be.

Challenge and Change: Elena Sarra, HIV Programme Co-ordinator, explores the issues related to gender and HIV. The Church of Scotland HIV programme supports a number of partner projects across the globe that aim to empower women living with HIV to achieve financial autonomy through learning new skills and obtaining access to support groups and resources.

Lonely at Christmas: Our partner ALTERnativity is this year trying to understand what it means to feel lonely at christmas. They are collecting and sharing the stories of people for whom Christmas is not a happy, cheery time. They have also been developing resources that offer space for reflection, conversation, worship and action, and that people can 'pick n mix' depending what would work best for their situation. Christmas in Kolkata – the city of joy: Rev Swarup Bar, Presbyter in the Diocese of Kolkata, Church of North India (CNI) shares the vibrancy of Advent and Christmas in Kolkata. Christmas in Kolkata definitely is a multi-cultural and multi-faceted event upholding the spirit of joy and friendship for all.

Engaging and Empowering Ekwendeni's women: Marjorie Clark, HIV Programme Co-ordinator interviews Esther Lupafya, who coordinates Ekwendeni Hospital AIDS programme (EHAP) supporting vulnerable local women's self-help groups. The women have access to a savings and credit group where they pay an agreed amount each week into the group's account. This enables them to take out small interest loans, which they can use to invest in small scale businesses such as marketing vegetables, selling fish or baking doughnuts. This gets them started in generating income to afford school fees, buy clothes and food. It also gives them confidence and empowers them to be able to support themselves and their communities.

Bearing witness in Italy: Rt Rev Angus Morrison, shares about the social ministry of the Waldensian Church. (The Waldensian Evangelical Church is an Italian Protestant denomination and was founded in the 12th Century.) As moderator he visited the Waldensian Church, our partner in Italy, along with Ian Alexander of the World Mission Council and Martin Johnstone of the Church and Society Council. They visited congregations, met church leaders and saw significant areas of church work and witness supporting refugees in Rome, Sicily, Bescia, Torre Pellice and Turin.
