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Letter From the Minister

Dear Friends and Members of St. Margaret's,

I love Christmas and the buzz and excitement of the season, but Easter for me is that moment in the life of the Church where we proclaim what is central to the life and witness of the Church. Christmas is all about the Incarnation – God becoming one of us in the person of Jesus Christ, God the Son and this is remarkable. Easter is the climax where we see why He came and how it impacts upon our lives.

The Cross is a constant reminder to us of so many things. It is first of all an indicator of our failure in the eyes of God. In the Cross we see the cost of our sins and failings and weaknesses: There is no escaping the reality of how God sees what we have all done with our lives. However, the Cross is Good News for us. In the Cross we see God, through Jesus Christ, rectifying and paying the price of our sins. The price Christ pays physically and spiritually was to absorb our failings, weaknesses and guilt and once and for all pay in full the price for us in order that we might be forgiven and declared not guilty by God. That is such good news – there is none better. Because of the Cross and our faith in what Jesus did for us on the Cross, we receive an assurance from God that He will not proceed with the case against us – ever!!

Easter's good news does not end at the Cross – we have to consider the power and meaning of the Resurrection. What a glorious day when Jesus, by His own power, conquered the power of death over Him. However, He did more than that. In his death on the Cross He represented us and so too in His Resurrection! He conquered death not just for Himself but for all of His people in order that we might go forward in life with the assurance that we have now got eternal life and one day when we pass from this world our life will eventually become complete at the final Resurrection – Death does not have the final say for us – Jesus does!!!

Easter, my friends, the glorious culmination of Christ's mission on earth and an indicator for us of all that is good.

The Church Roof

It has been evident for some years now that our church roof, which has lasted 40 years, has reached the end of its useful life. The fact is that there is so much wrong with the roof, it has gone beyond normal maintenance and needs to be stripped and renewed. This is going to be a very costly exercise [the architect is in the process of working out the exact cost] and we will put together as a Session a funding package [part of which will be the profits from the café over the next 5 years]. However, what I am asking each member of the congregation to consider is making either a one-off donation or regular donations to the "Roof Fund." Payments need to be made to the church but clearly designated for the Roof. I have started to put a weekly sum in the envelopes provided and will do so for the next few years. Please consider a generous response as this will secure physically the future of our church for another generation.

Youth and Family Worker

This has been put on over the last year while we waited to put in a renewed application for £30,000 over the next 3 years. Some people have suggested that we ought to wait till the roof is done and paid for before we consider employing someone. However to wait for 5 years I believe will take us beyond the point of recovery and if you look around at the age profile of our congregation you can see how urgently we need to get someone in who is dedicated to developing a ministry that brings in a new generation.

On the up-side, we already have £19,000 in funds [over £1k in donations from members, £8K from the café and £10K from Presbytery]. All of this is good but not quite enough and I am asking that those like myself that have a heart for this ministry donate generously either in a one off donation or in a weekly/monthly donation.

The Minister is running the project and all donations can be given to him but made out to the church.

Book Review: **LENT, EASTER...ANYTIME**

by St Margaret's Reader

Lent and Easter provide great opportunities to read something spiritual, something reflective, something different.

Here are three suggestions by favourite authors of mine.

"The Journey – with Jesus to Jerusalem and the Cross" by John Pritchard

John Pritchard was Bishop of Oxford until his retirement in 2014. He has written many books all 'easy' to read. In this 146 page book, we are given a first-hand account of 'the journey' through the eyes of the disciple John. He narrates what he sees and hears. It is both amusing and helpful. A refreshing new way of thinking about Jesus and his final weeks and passion – whether you are familiar with the events or being introduced to them for the first time.

"The Nail: Being part of the Passion" by Stephen Cottrell.

This small book – just 98 pages – allows us to reflect on the crucifixion of Jesus. Imagine yourself there, on your own or part of a small group of bystanders. Then seven different characters from the story step forward one after the other to tell of their experiences of Jesus passion. Each of the characters asks 'Who killed Christ?' and 'Who was responsible?'

There is also some supporting material for use in worship. The nails are used symbolically to inspire personal reflection and questions of our own.

Stephen Cottrell is Bishop of Chelmsford and has also published many easy to read and absorbing books.

And for something completely different, anytime you like – how about

"Adventures in Human Being" by Gavin Francis?

Gavin is local lad, brought up in Carnock and schooled at Queen Anne. He is a GP and author now of several books. Some of the men in the congregation may remember him leading a discussion a couple of years ago at our monthly breakfast group on the subject of 'men's health issues'.

In this latest book – winner of the Saltire Society non-fiction book of the year 2015 - he demonstrates the ways in which the body has been imagined and understood (or misunderstood) down the ages. It has been described as a '*user's guide to the body and a celebration of its marvels*' which will '*transform the way you think about being alive, whether in sickness or in health.*'

The book and its authors have received rave reports. Award winning author, Hilary Mantel wrote – "*A sober and beautiful book about the landscape of the human body: thought provoking and eloquent.*"

WORLD LEPROSY DAY 2016

A coffee morning was held after the church service on 7th February with the proceeds going to the Leprosy Mission Scotland. The sum of £205 was raised, which was a fantastic amount to be collected, thanks to everyone who contributed to this event.

NEWS SNIPPETS FROM THE WORLD MISSION COUNCIL

The main focus of the World Mission magazine this time is the Fairtrade Foundation and the Fairtrade Fortnight (29 February – 13 March). We are encouraged to think about where our breakfast items come from and how the producers are treated. Do any of these items Tea, Coffee, Porridge, Banana, Toast feature in your breakfast? It is easy to forget who produced these items and where they came from.

Fairtrade now reaches over 1.5 million farmers and workers across the globe, ensuring fair pay and working conditions, but with approximately 795 million people undernourished globally there is still a long way to go to end the injustice. Martin Luther King famously said

'before you finish eating breakfast in the morning, you've depended on more than half the world'. Look for the Fairtrade logo when buying products to support the farmers.

February/March Magazine features are; The Big Fairtrade Breakfast, Prayer Focus by Elaine Duncan, CEO of the Scottish Bible Society, One World Shop, Stand up for farmers in Israel and Palestine, World Day of Prayer, Faith in Action and Hope, Fairtrade Breakfast Recipe.

The One World Shop has moved to new premises in the basement of the City of Edinburgh Methodist Church at Nicolson Square Edinburgh, previously situated at St John's Church, Lothian Road. The move is for 2 years until a re-development project is carried out at St John's. There is also a thriving Fair Trade café situated at the Methodist Church which also holds classes, events and conferences.

World Day of Prayer is a global, ecumenical movement of Christian women joined together to observe a common day of prayer each year on the first Friday in March. Our motto of "Informed Prayer and Prayerful Action" signifies that prayer and action are inseparable. (World Day of Prayer International Committee)

This year the World Day of Prayer is Friday 4th March. The host country for World Day of Prayer 2016 is Cuba. After the Revolution a trade embargo was imposed by the United States and it brought Cuba economic isolation and material scarcity. Cuba is officially an atheist state and subsequently isolation formed around people of faith. The women of the Presbyterian Reformed Church in Cuba (PRCC) tell of how they quietly but determinedly kept churches open despite pressure from all around them. The women remained strong in their Christian faith and how they nurtured their children in that faith.

Now the embargo is lifting, but uncertainty remains for the Cuban people. However many congregations still have a strong nucleus of women members and men and children are now filling the churches. The Cuban women today delight in seeing the church growing once more and being able to share the love of God to their community. Christians in more than 170 countries will gather to learn about, pray for, and celebrate Cuba in solidarity with the women of Cuba through the World Day of Prayer
