That is, until they met the next fellow who screamed, "I never saw anything so cruel in all my life. Two intelligent human beings riding on the poor little scrawny donkey." They dismounted, picked up the donkey and carried it down the road.

Further down the road our trio met a couple of men travelling together. When the parties had passed, one of the men turned to the other and said, "Did you ever see two fools carrying a donkey before?"

How to please everyone? Don't even try! Just try to please God. *"For do I now persuade men, or God? Or do I seek to please men? For if I yet pleased men, I should not be the servant of Christ,"* (Gal. 1:10).

As Christians we listen to many voices, all of them telling us how they expect us to live and behave. These people are not on the road of faith and therefore we ought not to take what they say to us seriously. Increasingly we have begun to be governed by the opinions of our culture and this is something we have to free ourselves from and instead listen again to Christ and his word and way. He too was often criticised by the crowd, the Pharisees, the Priests and the Teachers of the Law but he chose another way – the way of the Father. Will this be our way?

GRANDPA'S HANDS

This is good. I'll never look at my hands the same!

Grandpa, some ninety plus years, sat feebly on the patio bench. He didn't move, just sat with his head down staring at his hands. When I sat down beside him he didn't acknowledge my presence and the longer I sat, I wondered if he was OK.

Finally, not really wanting to disturb him but wanting to check on him at the same time, I asked him if he was OK.

He raised his head and looked at me and smiled. "Yes, I'm fine. Thank you for asking," he said in a clear strong voice.

"I didn't mean to disturb you, Grandpa, but you were just sitting here staring at your hands and I wanted to make sure you were OK," I explained to him.

"Have you ever looked at your hands," he asked. "I mean really looked at your hands?"

I slowly opened my hands and stared down at them. I turned them over, palms up and then palms down. No, I guess I had never really looked at my hands as I tried to figure out the point he was making. Grandpa smiled and related this story:

"Stop and think for a moment about the hands you have, how they have served you well throughout your years. These hands, though wrinkled, shrivelled, and weak, have been the tools I have used all my life to reach out and grab and embrace life. They put food in my mouth and clothes on my back.

As a child, my mother taught me to fold them in prayer.

They tied my shoes and pulled on my boots.

They have been dirty, scraped and raw, swollen and bent.

They were uneasy and clumsy when I tried to hold my new-born son.

Decorated with my wedding band they showed the world that I was married and loved by someone special.

They trembled and shook when I buried my parents and spouse and walked my daughter down the aisle.

They have covered my face, combed my hair, and washed and cleansed the rest of my body.

They have been sticky and wet, bent and broken, dried and raw.

And to this day, when not much of anything else of me works real well, these hands hold me up, lay me down, and again continue to fold in prayer.

These hands are the mark of where I've been and the ruggedness of my life

But more importantly it will be these hands that God will reach out and take when he leads me home.

And with my hands He will lift me to His side and there I will use these hands to touch the face of Christ."

I will never look at my hands the same again. But I remember God reached out and took my grandpa's hands and led him home.

When my hands are hurt or sore I think of Grandpa. I know he has been stroked and caressed and held by the hands of God. I, too, want to touch the face of God and feel His hands upon my face.



NEWS SNIPPETS FROM THE WORLD MISSION COUNCIL

Articles featured in the August/September magazine include:

Christian Aid Malawi Appeal – an emergency appeal has been launched to help support communities in Malawi through a devastating drought that has left 6.5 million people without access to enough food. The first £70,000 will be match-funded by the Scottish Government. Malawi is facing its worst food crisis for a decade, following prolonged dry spells, erratic rainfall and last year's devastating floods, which destroyed food reserves, farm land and crops.

Prayer Focus- is on food security. Having access to food and a regular intake allows people taking antiretroviral (ARV) medication for HIV to lead a relatively normal life. Without food ARVs can have unpleasant side effects, so unpleasant that it can put people off taking them, giving the virus the chance to thrive again, to the detriment of the person's health. The following prayer from Mwandi Mission Hospital focuses on this theme:

Gracious God, source and giver of all good gifts, we praise and worship you; you love and care for each one of us, even better than the most loving parent.

You provide us with our food at the right time, and when we need it; we take hold of it from your open and loving hands, and bless you as you continue to fill us with good things.

Keeping Girls in School – At the General Assembly Rev Moses Kasiomu from Malaw told them about the Synod of Blantyre's new strategic priority – keeping girls in school. The education of girls in Malawi is of the utmost concern for the Church of Central African Presbyterian Synod of Blantyre and has become a key part of their strategic plan for the Synod. There are many reasons why girls are not educated to the same level as boys and the Synod has put practical plans in place to tackle this issue in order to improve the lives of all people as part of the Synod's socio-economic transformation of communities.

Highlights of World Mission at the General Assembly this year – including the announcement that £156,000 had been raised for 'Let us build a house' which has now risen to £190,000.

175 Year Anniversary of the Scottish Mission in Budapest – read how the Protestant Chaplaincy was set up in 1841.

Twinning – Inspirational and Satisfying – Members of Livingston Old Parish Church and the Church of North India congregation of St James', Kolkata, have been enjoying friendship with one another since their twinning began in 2009. Rev Shreereaj Mohanty, Minister at St James', explains that the twinning with Livingston Old has allowed their congregation to realise their potential, and enabled them to reach out further to the street children in their area.
