# New Year Greetings from the Minister

New Year is the time that many of us make resolutions – we recognise that there are so many things in our lives that, if changed, would make us better people. So we resolve to change. However, many of those things we seek to change are mostly superficial and really will make little difference to our

lives. We might resolve to lose weight, go to the gym, take more exercise, stop eating chocolate! – the list could go on, and when we arrive at Lent in a short time, the list will come out again.

I would like our resolutions to be more meaningful! Here is what I mean. First of all, let's get our relationship with God right. If we have not personally come to God through Jesus Christ and made a personal profession of faith — acknowledging that Jesus died for our sins and we need Him alone to be our Saviour and Lord — then let us come with all haste to Jesus and get that relationship with God right.

Second, get our relationship with God right. I know that sounds like the first but it is not. Is there something in our life that needs repentance – some unconfessed sin or wrong relationship; is there within us, unresolved anger or lack of love – come to God in confession and get that made right by asking forgiveness and a new power to live in a right way.

Third, let us all commit ourselves to prayer for this church and its future — let us make this a daily habit. Listen to what Justin Welby, the archbishop of Canterbury has to say on the matter of prayer; "We are not the Rotary Club with a pointy roof. We are the Church and prayer must come first. Without prayer there will be no renewal of the church and without a renewal of the church there is very little hope for the world." He goes on to say that there has never been any renewal and revival of the church without the people of God understanding the urgency of prayer — calling out with urgency for God to pour out His Spirit and revive the church. This is something only God can do but is linked to the urgent prayers of God's people.

There are resolutions that matter! Blessings for the year ahead,

# **The Roof Appeal**



We are now well underway in our appeal to raise funds for the roof – I have been astonished by the generosity of members of the church thus far – the income figure so far is £32,100

Allow me to tell a story that warms my heart and I hope does your own – one of our children from JAM club that meets on a Sunday evening heard about our appeal for funds – the wee soul donated £10 from the money she had been given from her birthday – is that not inspiring?

Please think of ways that we might raise funds and give generously to the roof appeal. It is important that we remember the reason we are doing this is so that this building is well maintained: in order for us to carry out our outreach works; provide a place where we can nurture the people of God in their faith and worship God together. It is also important for us to have a building fit for purpose to pass on to a new generation.

Remember too, that all profits from the Thursday Café will go to the Appeal and so as well as excellent food and company your attendance at the Café will make a difference.

If you wish to make a personal donation, just slip it into an envelope and hand it either to the minister, Moira Watson or Audrey McArthur and it will be placed in the designated fund.

### **LOCAL CHURCH REVIEW**

Presbytery will be visiting our congregation to carry out a five-yearly local church review – this is something that is done with every congregation in Presbytery, and the review will be led by Rev Norman Grant who is well known to the congregation. This will happen sometime in January.

Part of the condition for the local review is that there is evidence of a five year plan being worked through by the Session and in the life of the congregation. The Session met to discuss this in late November and Gordon Brown led a very fruitful introduction. A paper has been given to every member of the Kirk Session and it will be discussed in full at a Session conference on the afternoon of the 8<sup>th</sup> of January 2017.

From this Session conference will come a remit to each committee to come up with an action plan for the next five years – the committees are Christian Education and Worship, Property [church and manse], Finance, Fellowship, Pastoral Care, Outreach and finally Youth.

A MAP [Mission Action Plan] will be produced and presented to the Kirk Session for actioning and approval on the 6<sup>th</sup> March and then presented to the Congregation at the AGM on Sunday 26<sup>th</sup> March after worship.

The purpose of this is to give clear direction to the church over the next five years and have aims and objectives to which we hold ourselves accountable over the period of the Plan.

Please pray for guidance especially to Gordon Brown as he leads and facilitates the Session Conference on 8<sup>th</sup> January and then meets with all the committees along with the minister.

You do of course require a computer to do this and the following is the procedure you should follow:

- Go to the St. Margaret's home page at www.stmargscos.org.uk
- Click on the "live service streaming" option from the menu at the top of the page.
- Click on the link on that page.

This will take you to the Dunfermline St. Margaret's Church of Scotland You Tube Channel where you will see the service live. If you go there any other time, you will be able to see a video recording of past services (there is one from 26<sup>th</sup> June there just now – trial run!!).

Should you require any help with this then do please get in touch and someone will come round and take you through the process – but it really is simple.

So no need to miss out on services now – thanks to the Thomsons for working on this!

### **ASKING FOR HELP**

Many of us don't like to ask for help. Maybe we see it as a sign of weakness or vulnerability or we fear others will see it that way. So we cling to the notion "I can manage" – even if that's not the case.

From time to time, say when we're sick, we'll receive offers of help. "Let me know if there's anything I can do to help." We've all made similar offers to others at some time. The problem is we seldom take up these offers of help, either there and then or later. Perhaps we think the person was just being polite, like saying "Have a nice day." But it isn't. Most people who offer help mean it. They want to help. But if they don't hear back from someone in need to whom they have offered help, they don't follow it up in case they will be seen as fussing, or worse, interfering.

In church there is a genuine desire to reach out to the parish community and offer help and service. I believe church members very much take to heart Christ's instruction to 'love others' in whatever we can. Our pastoral team does a terrific job maintaining contact with and supporting members and others, who would like to play an active part in the life of the church community, but for one reason or another, are unable to do so.

Think though how much more effective we could all be if in addition to <u>offering</u> help, we were <u>asked</u> for help. Imagine if we had a means, maybe through social media, of saying "we are here to help". Imagine if we were asked to – run errands, do some laundry, cook a meal, walk the dog, change a light bulb, chat to someone who is lonely, or provide a shoulder on which to cry on. We could do so much more to serve each other and serve our parish community, if only people asked for help. And those we help may then feel drawn to be part of our church community.

Sadly, our reluctance to ask for help is now the accepted norm. It is the same kind of reluctance, or fear, which holds many of us back in life. But fears, like any emotion, can be overcome. It takes time and effort. As a church we must

find new and novel ways to persuade our parish community that "we are here to help" and "we want to help – no strings attached!"

Finally, look at it another way. By asking for help, we provide an opportunity for others to have a purpose and to grow as individuals. We may even be helping to fill a vacuum in their lives. And that is a great gift to give anyone.

Let's start the New Year by not only offering help, but asking for it, when we ourselves need it.

# J.A.M. Report

You will, I'm sure, be familiar with the saying "time flies when you're having fun!"......and we've had lots of fun so the weeks have flown! It is always a privilege to be a part of a Child's life and share in their "ups and downs." It's wonderful to hear about blessings which they have been given....but, sometimes, our hearts reach out to them when they tell us about things which make them feel sad.

In November, we remembered and honoured those brave men and women who were injured or indeed lost their lives whilst serving their country. Those of you who attended church that morning will recall the very moving service. On display were the medals won by Ian Carlton (during the second world war) and also those won by his father (during the first world war.) Ian very kindly allowed us to show them to the children at J.A.M. club and they were extremely interested- lots of questions were asked and thoughts shared. The older boys and girls expressed their anxiety that there seems no end to war- news reports on television serve to remind us of this fact. We spoke about how wars begin, how the way we treat one another can have far-reaching implications. This discussion led us to think about the way Jesus wants us to live our lives today. So, thank you Ian, the loan of your medals helped lead our boys and girls to think about the value of peace.

In an "object lesson," using toothpaste, we focussed on the power of words. A child was asked to squeeze the toothpaste out of the tube.....and then asked to put it back into the tube! As you can imagine, this had everyone in giggles because of course it is well nigh impossible. However, it served to demonstrate that our words are just like the toothpaste.....once spoken, they cannot be taken

back. Jesus wants us to speak kindly, respond gently and to "hold our tongue" when necessary.

More recently, we have all been extremely busy with the Christmas Fayre. We explained that all the money raised would be used to pay for a new church roof. The children were astounded at the amount of money required for this project but understood that every contribution counted.

Those of us who lead J.A.M. Club were truly humbled one evening when one of the girls told us that she wished to give £10 towards the roof fund. She had recently been given £20 birthday money and felt that she didn't need all of the money-so she decided to make a donation. I'm sure you will agree that this was a very generous and kind-hearted gift.

On 18<sup>th</sup> December, we shared in a very special service with our church family. Instead of a Nativity, we had a Christingle service! The children prepared their Christingles beforehand.....it was great fun putting sweets on cocktail sticks (of course there was a need for quality control and some dolly mixtures just had to be sampled!)

Seriously, it was a beautiful way for the children to learn about the great gifts which we have been given from our Lord. We entered the sanctuary during the first hymn, Carefully Carrying our Christingles. Our minister explained the meaning of each symbol involved and, at the conclusion of the service, the Christingle candles were each lit by an Advent candle. We were delighted to welcome several children's family members into church and it really was a very special service for everyone who attended.

The theme of the service was centred upon gifts and we took this opportunity to give a very special person two Christmas gifts from J.A.M. club. Throughout the year Iain, our minister, gives

unstintingly of his time to support everyone at J.A.M. club. He advises, teaches, encourages, listens, supports, makes us laugh.....the list could go on! We all felt that it would be a nice idea to give him a gift to show our appreciation. He was given a beautiful book about Jerusalem which was signed by everyone at J.A.M. club. His other gift was something we discovered he loves.....bread and butter pudding!


