<u>From the Minister:</u> Dreaming our Future

The Church faces a huge challenge! Not St. Margaret's but the whole Church of Scotland! I have just spent a few days with all of the other Presbytery Clerks in Scotland and there is no doubt that we are

struggling big time. We are facing a critical shortage of ministers – by the middle of this year in Dunfermline we will be 14 ministers covering 24 churches and it may not get much better than this! The National Church, Presbytery and we in St. Margaret's face challenging times.

In St. Margaret's, we are putting the finishing touches on a five-year plan – a plan that has mission, outreach and ministry to families and young people at the heart of the matter. You will soon see the plan that it going to the Session for approval at the beginning of March. It is a plan that has the following at its core:

- Meaningful and inspiring worship.
- Good pastoral care.
- Strong fellowship.
- Good financial stewardship.
- Good care of our buildings church and manse.
- Innovative Mission and Outreach to draw people in.
- Family and Youth initiative to bring new life to our fellowship.

All of this needs your co-operation at the following levels:

- Be faithful in church attendance and encouraging new initiatives.
- On Special Sundays bring people with you to Church be bold and ask.
- Pray for God to Revive our fellowship and community.
- Offer yourself and your gifts for the sake of the Kingdom.
- Be generous financially.

The last in the above list is important! Our needs financially to do essential work in the church and the manse has been identified in our architect's five yearly report. We are going to have to find in excess of £200,000 to put everything right – including the roof. I do not want the next 5 to 7 years [my final years as a minister] to be spent fundraising – I want them to be spent in initiatives to grow the church and pass it on to a new minister and new generation, in good heart. I am therefore challenging all of us to give as generously as we are able in the coming months to close the gap between the £45,000 we have raised so far and the £200,000 we need. I know it is a big ask – a huge challenge –

but God has maybe placed this before us to test the sincerity of our faith and the depth of our discipleship.

Are we up to it? I think we are and I trust and hope you will support the overall plan as we seek to grow the church over the next five years.

WELCOME SUNDAY

One of the matters under discussion within the Outreach Group Plan for the next 5 years is to how to encourage new people to come to Church. This has of course been tried before so it is important that we look for "change" – and face up to the fact that "change" may be necessary to attract new people – or indeed bring some of our "silent" members back.

There are a few "changes" being considered – perhaps not all of them being brought on board at the one time but introduced over a period of time. However we do want to make a start as quickly as possible while at the same time making sure we give ourselves time to organise what is necessary. The first step is to introduce a

This will be introduced by giving an invitation to others to come along to join in our service and that the service for that day will be just a bit "different" with perhaps the seating arrangements and the tea and coffee set up being somewhat different as well. This would happen on (say) the first Sunday of every month and we are keen to trial this on the first Sunday of May or June (or both) so we can learn whether any changes require to be made with us then "launching" this as a regular event from the 1st Sunday in September. It may well be that by the time that September comes around we may be able to introduce other of our ideas!!

It goes without saying that we require your support to make this effective and successful. The future of St. Margaret's requires mission and truly the time for talking is over and we need to take action to ensure that St. Margaret's will still be going strong in the years ahead.

Listen and look out for announcements of how this will all unfold and the part that YOU can play to help in its success!

LIVE STREAM – 2 MONTHS ON

If you go to the Dunfermline St Margaret's YouTube channel, you'll see a comment on the Live Streaming of our Service on 5th February:

"Apologies from St Margaret's (not-so) technical team - we should have paid more attention to Rev Grant's Sermon title: "Imitating Christ's humility and shining like stars!" Here we were feeling pleased to show our visiting Minister that St Margaret's Services are live streamed now, and glad we'd managed not to cut off the Minister's Benediction at the end, as has often happened, and the audio was sounding better...well, audio is OK, but we lost the video!! No humility, no stars, alas! Tune in to see how we do next week!"

Despite the teething problems, though, at the time of going to press, viewing figures for successfully transmitted Services were:

Christmas Day 68, subsequent weeks: 55,111,69, 55, 55,20 (though the last one is only just published, so will no doubt pick up viewers later on.)

A WEE REMINDER that these figures include those who watched the recording later on – after the live broadcast, the Service is kept on YouTube as a recording which you can watch at any time.

We have had positive comments from two ladies and a gentleman in the congregation who aren't able to attend church, and they commented that it made them feel like they were present, part of the worship. Two ladies from our congregation who were on holiday tuned in for the same reason. The broadcasts are not slick or professional, but we feel that this is an encouragement to folks who may be apprehensive about coming to church: The Service with the 111 views was shared by Presbytery on their Facebook page. lain was preaching and we learned a new song. Morna commented on the St Margaret's Facebook page:

"Real people sharing Faith with humour - and with a great preacher! The prospect of going into a Church can seem scary if you haven't experienced it worries about when to stand or sit, what if I don't know the hymns? what if someone asks me a question? Seeing this would dispel a lot of these worries! We're just ordinary folk...but we have an awesome GOD!"

This highlights the most important aspect of broadcasting our Services: they reach out in mission, to proclaim GOD's name, for His Kingdom's sake.

> In life we loved you dearly, In death we love you still, In our hearts you hold a place No one can ever fill.


It broke our hearts to lose you, But you didn't go alone, For part of us went with you, The day God took you home.

FAIR TRADE FORTNIGHT – 27 FEBRUARY – 12 MARCH

This year's Fairtrade fortnight theme is the Fair Break. It's all about using our break times to have a Fairtrade cup of tea, and learn about the Fairtrade movement. There's plenty to get involved in! Find your resources here: fortnight.fairtrade.org.uk

There is more to Fairtrade than just tea and coffee, chocolate and bananas. There is a huge range of Fairtrade products for us all to enjoy. We had a look at what was out there, and found some pretty unusual and interesting products.

Products such as jewellery, cosmetics, rubber gloves, laundry goods, footballs, wine rack (Fairtrade home ware: <u>www.tradecraft.co.uk</u>), Palestinian products (supporting businesses in the West Bank and Gaza, through buying Fairtrade products from our partner organisation, Hadeel at <u>www.hadeel.org</u> or on George Street, Edinburgh), Fairtrade foods and flowers.

Buying Fairtrade has become much easier to do, and there are loads of interesting products out there! Every time you buy Fairtrade you are investing in sustainable and fair produce.

As well as providing a fair wage to producers, the Fairtrade mark ensures that the rights of workers are upheld. Communities can also receive a Premium if they work as a Fairtrade co-operative. This Premium can be spent on schools, roads, and medical services.

FAIRTRADE IN THE BORDER CHURCH CARLISE

Christian Robertson co-ordinates the Fairtrade activities of the Border Kirk in

Carlisle. A story of how the church got involved in Fairtrade and the difference it makes to people across the world. This article appears in the 76th issue of the World Mission Magazine it can be accessed on the Church of Scotland website or I can provide a paper copy of it.

OIKOCREDIT: INVESTMENTS THAT REALLY DO CHANGE LIVES:

Monica Middleton, National Director at Oikocredit UK and Ireland, shares about making a social and economic impact in disadvantaged parts of the world.

In 2015, social investing pioneer and cooperative, Oikocredit, celebrated its

40th Anniversary following initiation by members of the World Council of Churches. Significantly, churches have always played an important role in Oikocredit, with the Church of Scotland being a UK founder member of the cooperative alongside many churches across Europe. Oikocredit remains guided by the principle of empowering people in low income countries. They believe that the most effective and sustainable means of assisting those in need is by providing them with an opportunity to create their own paths out of poverty through the instrument of investment.

Since 1975, Oikocredit has disbursed over €2 billion of its investors' capital in 1,670 social enterprise partners (such as Divine Chocolate, Cafédirect and their cooperative farmers) to provide vital finance and technical support to the most disadvantaged communities in the world. Investors' capital is focused on small scale agriculture, renewable energy and infrastructure projects, with a significant proportion invested in inclusive finance institutions.

Individuals and churches can support Oikocredit. Even small investments can
