From the Minister

WISDOM OF THE YEARS

This morning at worship I spoke about a debate I heard on the radio where some young people were speaking about denying the vote to people once they get to a certain age! The import of the argument was that young

people know better what kind of future they envisage – what arrogance! Not to mention sheer ageism! Since when has lack of experience of life been a qualification for knowing more about life? I don't want to make a big issue of the suggestion, save to say that the same people, in twenty- or thirty-years' time, will have a very different view on the matter!

But it did get me thinking and along with a book I am reading called, "A Good Old Age" by Derek Prime, who is nearly ninety, I would like to reflect on the whole issue of age.

Let me begin by suggesting that as we live in our advanced years we should do so with thankfulness because there are many [the vast majority of our world] who have not been given the blessing of living so long. I realise that age does not come alone and it is accompanied with various limitations but we ought every day to thank God for the length of our days.

Second, we need to grasp life's opportunities even within some of the limitations that older years brings to us. I am amazed when I witness the amount of good work that is done by so many "retired" people in our community – good work that could not be done without them! Retirement and older years is a time when we can choose what we want to do and in so doing make a difference to the lives of people.

Third, faith does not diminish but increase with age. There is more time to pray, consider our faith, meditate and reflect. There is more time to do the works of faith because we have retired from other work. There is also time to make ourselves available to younger people and offer them our wisdom and counsel and time.

We ought never to be intimidated by suggestions that because of advancing years we are a burden on society. Many of us worked for over 50 years, supported our society with tax and national insurance [and many of us still pay tax] as well as supporting children, grandchildren and others. We have done our bit and continue to try to make a difference and we will not be intimidated by such a selfish viewpoint that seeks to pull us down and make us feel guilty for living long – and in most cases, living well.

Finally, for any younger people reading this, celebrate the lives of the older people in your life, church and community, and if some of the older people you know are a bit cranky, remember that there are a lot of cranky younger people that we older people know! Spend time listening to the older folks you know – listen to their stories and gain from their wisdom. The Bible encourages us to respect age and the wisdom and experience it brings. Any body of people, like a church, needs the enthusiasm of youth, the energy of younger into middle years and the experience of age – we need all together and one without the other is the poorer.

Your Minister, your Friend and someone who is fast moving into the third of the above three categories!

From the Kirk

And when you pray....

Matthew 6:7a

"How do you eat yours?" That was the question in a certain egg-shaped confectionery advert. The implication being that there is no right way to do it, but rather it's about how you best experience the egg.

How do you pray?

Perhaps you haven't really thought about it too much. Perhaps it's now hard to concentrate because you're thinking about chocolate, but regardless of appetite, past experiences, how we wrap it up or try to explain it, prayer can be rather confusing. It can often be a mystery. It can at times seem like a chore. It can even be a blessed relief.

So then, how *do* you pray?

Are you a morning person? Do you greet the sunrise with thanks and praise to our God? Do you utter hopeful words and try and live them throughout the day to come? Are you more spontaneous? Do you respond to life with a 'breath prayer', off the cuff, as life makes you dance to its tune and in each moment you seek the steadying hand of our Creator and Sustainer?

Perhaps you find yourself needing space. Like a free-diver coming up for air after plumbing the depths. Maybe you carve out some time in your day to be still and know the presence of God. You may prefer to reflect on your day in the presence of God, as was the practice of Ignatius of Loyola, who gave us the daily examen – a way of praying that helps us recognise God's presence in the midst of the day just lived.

The practice of prayer is part of the lifeblood of our faith. We may find ourselves in the darkest of circumstances, when prayer is the only thing that we can turn to for comfort. We might see prayer as that thing we do together on a Sunday, or as the words said on our behalf by a minister or worship leader. Maybe it is the one thing that keeps us going, those times when we can just let God know how we are feeling. It might even be that thing that happens by accident or that we're unaware of until, looking back on a time of quiet, perhaps with a cup of tea or watching the world go by from our living room window, we realise that in the stillness, God was there the whole time.

Whatever your habit or preference may not really matter. What is important is that we are having the conversation, that we are opening ourselves up to God in whatever moment we can manage, that in some way prayer is part of our life. Prayer may be a constant companion on the journey, or a friend that visits once in a while, to bring comfort and solace. It may be something deeper, more mysterious that is largely left unspoken, something felt, yearned for, grieved over or something long-forgotten brought to mind.

How we pray then, is not the most important thing, but rather that the experience of prayer and the encounter with God is recognised. That our faith is tended and our relationship with God is nurtured, in precious moments. No fancy wrapping is needed and it may not always taste sweet but, in the midst of life, listening for and opening our hearts to God is indeed food for the soul.

Well, nearly everyone began-we soon realised little Kelsie's chin was level with the table, which made eating a bit tricky! With the support of two cushions, all was well. The meal progressed without further ado until someone mentioned (just as the ice-cream was being served) that Santa was on his way! Believe me, ice-cream and chocolate flake have never been eaten so fast. Thankfully, Santa had managed to fit us into his busy schedule and duly arrived to distribute gifts to everyone. A very happy group of children left the hotel that evening....taking with them memories to treasure. When I later spoke with Pamela, she said it had been a pleasure to invite the boys and girls and "was not really such a big thing to do." Well, I beg to differ. I'm sure you'll agree with me that it was a wonderful thing to do and I thank God for giving us people like Pamela who richly bless our lives. As always, our aim is to remind the children about why Christians celebrate Christmas....to explain that, amidst the fun of anticipating which gifts we'll receive, we must remember that the most important gift of all is Jesus. "The Mystery of the Bell!"

Do you have the answer to the Mystery of the "new" St Margaret's bell? The huge project to replace St Margaret's crumbling roof was successfully completed in 2018, with financial donations and grants from many generous sponsors and much hard work.

Many thanks go to Fife Environmental Trust for sponsoring one particular part of this: the refurbishment of the bell tower.

In 2018 there was a big initiative from the British government to encourage the ringing of bells nationwide, and throughout the world, on Sunday 11th November – this to commemorate the bells that rang out on that day in 1918, after years of wartime silence, to mark the Armistice.

In Scotland, there was even an invitation for churches to record the sound of their bells ringing, to be sent in to the composer Martin Suckling. He composed a piece for the Scottish Chamber Orchestra called *"Meditation – after Donne"* (after John Donne's famous poem, *"Ask not for whom the bell tolls..."*) which was interwoven with some of these recordings and performed for the first time in early November. Unfortunately, we were too late to record and have included the St Margaret's bell! It had to be taken down and sent away to be professionally restored, having been exposed to the elements at Touch for over 40 years – and not having rung for twenty years or so.

Now comes the Mystery!!

The bell (pictured on the front cover, photo taken by Irene Cunningham as "evidence" just before it was re-hung!) bears the date "1812", and the professional restorers confirmed that this was indeed the date the bell was made! Well, you may think, the old St Margaret's Church in East Port was built in 1826 – it must have been that the new Touch St Margaret's was re-using and honouring a part of its heritage? Sounds plausible, but church members have told Rev Iain Greenshields that the old St Margaret's was the only church in town which had no bell! A bit of detective work with Henderson's "Annals of Dunfermline" tells us that the St Margaret's congregation was formed in September 1825, after a "Disruption" in the Queen Anne Street Church (later to be Erskine Church) over the choice of a new Minister. The "minority(!)" of 600 broke away, taking a short lease of the Maygate Chapel until a new building could be built for them to worship in, with a Minister of their own choosing.

Now it seems unlikely that we should now have a bell which came from Queen Anne Church, or from a Chapel which was only leased for 2 years.

Was this a bell donated from another church? a ship? a school? purchased by an individual as a gift? Do you remember it being installed at Touch in the early 1970's, perhaps?

The bell is of fine quality, with a sound that is not at all loud or sombre – it rings a sweet note, and is a beautiful call to Worship on Sunday mornings.

But if you can shed any light on this Mystery, please let us Know!
